Have you seen this guy on the left? If so you've found a tent caterpillar. These caterpillars form the webs we find in limbs of trees that protect these larvae as they develop. In their adult form they are brown and yellowish moths with a wingspan of about 1 inch. The damage these caterpillars make on trees/shrubs is localized to the webbing.
