Things to Know about Insects before the 2023 Growing Season

Rice stink bug

Populations were substantially lower for most of the Coastal Bend this year as we experienced drought which then reduced their food sources. Following the growing season, most of us have received enough rainfall to support plant growth and development, including many of the grass species in the environment. We expect that this sudden moisture will aid rice stink bug populations to rebound to levels more similar to 2021 or even prior seasons. Pyrethroid resistance is an ongoing issue for much of the Coastal Bend with greater levels of resistance detected in the southern reaches of District 11. Two Section 2(ee) bulletins have been issued for products containing dimethoate and more are anticipated. My lab will collect rice stink bug populations for one more season in 2023 to finalize our report on the pest in addition to field trials.

Pest thresholds

Thresholds for insects feeding on grain sorghum heads have been updated for the 2023 growing season to reflect more accurate analyses. These thresholds will be published in the 2023 version of the Sorghum Insect Management Guide on AgriLife Learn. In addition, we continue to update the cotton fleahopper thresholds as more data from new years and sites are collected and analyzed. Thresholds will be dynamic to reflect crop potential, crop value, and control costs.

Bt resistance

The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) continues to discuss the management programs for lepidopteran pests in corn and cotton with the product registrations (e.g., Bayer, Syngenta, Corteva). This process continues to take longer than expected and no new updates have been provided in the last few months. I anticipate that a new framework will be launched just before the 2023 growing season. In the meantime, growers and consultants should inspect all cotton for bollworms with greatest efforts in conventional through two-gene cotton."
