National 4-H Conference is the pinnacle experience in 4-H Civic Engagement, providing the opportunity for young people to connect, learn, engage, lead and impact their communities, nation and world. At the conference, delegates will have the opportunity to participate in round table discussions and present to federal partner agencies along with the opportunity for delegates to engage with their U.S. Senators and Representatives.

Land-Grant University 4-H Departments send delegations of 4-H youth between ages 15 and 19 to participate in the National 4-H Conference. Delegates work together in the four weeks prior to the conference to prepare briefings on important topics. During the conference, delegates will virtually present their prepared briefings to federal officials in Washington, D.C. 4-H youth also have the opportunity to engage in personal development experiences that increase their knowledge, resources, and skills while discussing topics affecting youth and 4-H programming nationwide.

Delegates not only learn while at the conference: they are empowered to create positive social change in their communities and have the opportunity to practice and apply their skills in a real-world setting.

### National 4-H Conference - April 19-24, 2024

### WHAT IS NATIONAL 4-H CONFERENCE?

National 4-H Conference is the Secretary of Agriculture's premier youth development opportunity to engage youth in developing recommendations for the 4-H Youth Development Program. If you want to strengthen your leadership and/or citizenship projects, this is an excellent opportunity.

National 4-H Conference is a working conference in which youth and adults--at the invitation of the Secretary of Agriculture--assist in the development of recommendations to help guide 4-H Youth Development Programs nationally and in their communities. This event brings together youth, volunteer leaders, and state and county Extension staff members from across the United States, the U.S. Territories, and the Canadian Provinces.

As the sponsor for this conference, the National 4-H Headquarters—located within Families, 4-H, and Nutrition at the U.S. Department of Agriculture's (USDA's) National Institute of Food and Agriculture (NIFA)—is charged with sharing the recommendations that emerge from the conference with the Secretary of Agriculture, national Extension Program Leaders, and others who determine 4-H programs. Each delegate chooses an important societal topic to discuss in a roundtable situation with other delegates. From the roundtable discussion, the groups prepare a briefing to present to federal stakeholders. This experiential approach ensures that the conference is a meaningful experience for the youth and adult participants. Social activities in the evening, tours of Monuments and Museums and cultural entertainment round out the conference.

### LOCATION:

The 2023 National 4-H Conference will be held at the Hyatt Regency Crystal City – Arlington, VA. It is right by the Ronald Reagan National Airport and approximately 5 miles from the Nation's Capitol, making it the perfect gateway to Washington, D.C.'s leaders, monuments and museums.

### WHO SHOULD APPLY?

The National 4-H Conference requires youth who are focused and committed to working during the Conference and in their state. The Texas delegation will consist of 10-20 youth delegates, who will be required to engage in pre- and post-conference work and participate in all scheduled conference activities. The minimum age requirement for a Texas youth delegate is 15 years old (must be by January 1, 2024). The maximum age for a Texas youth delegate is 18.

### **APPLICATION PROCESS:**

Applications will open on December 1, 2023. Applications must be submitted online and certified through 4HOnline by <u>December 15, 2023</u>. Choose '2024 National 4-H Conference Delegate Application'. A fee is NOT required to complete the application. County Extension Office personnel will certify the application, so please communicate with your Extension Agent of your intent to apply. Final selection of delegates will be made on the basis of the online application; you may be contacted for a telephone interview. The final selection of delegates will be announced on, or before, <u>January 17, 2024</u>.

### COST:

The delegate's share of registration, adult chaperone registration(s), lodging, airfare, meals, and transportation costs between \$2,000.00-2,500.00 Once we receive the information from Nationals and can look at additional costs, we will let selected participants know the final cost. This registration fee will be due on February 1, 2024 payable through 4-HOnline.

### **TEXAS DELEGATION MEETING LOCATION:**

The Texas delegation will travel out of Houston, Austin, San Antonio or Dallas (depending on the cost of airline tickets and the geographical makeup of the delegation). All travel costs to the airport to meet the group is the responsibility of the delegate.



### APPLICATION INFOMATION

### **Tuition Waived Option**

Through various USDA funded grants, the BGBG program is able to provide 15 tuition waived spots per cohort for veterans, active military, and a select number of other beginning farmers and ranchers. Applications for a tuition waiver are now open on a rolling basis.

- 15 spots per cohort
- Application Required
- · Competitive process: Online application and 3 letters of support required
- In-person attendance to Basic Training & Graduation required; \$125 registration fee
- 100 hours of hands-on training required
- Only waives tuition for Phase 2; tuition waiver for Phase 3 based on performance in Phase 2

### Texas 4-H Natural Resources Photography Contest

2023 - 2024 State Rules and Guidelines

Updated: September 1, 2023

### **PURPOSE**

The Texas 4-H Natural Resources Photography Contest encourages observation within specific Natural Resources project areas and allows youth to demonstrate skills learned in the area of photography, including the use of photographic equipment and processing of photographs. This contest provides another opportunity to showcase the photographic work of 4-H members in all age divisions.

### OBJECTIVES

- To develop observation skills to be able to capture the life, action, beauty, diversity, and interactions within our natural resources in Texas.
- To develop skills in composition, light, story line, posing, and awareness.
- To gain knowledge about cameras, camera settings, photography dimension and resolution.
- To encourage 4-H members to use photography as a meaningful communication and observation tool in their lives.
- To utilize photographs which can promote and strengthen awareness and conservation of our natural resources.
- To provide a photography project showcase opportunity for all 4-H members interested in Natural Resources projects.
- To continue to share the message of 4-H.

RULES AND PROCEDU	RES		
Participation Eligibility	Any enrolled 4-H member in all 4-H age divisions (Jr., Int., Sr.) as of September 1, 2023. Participants do not need to be currently or previously active in a particular or any 4-H Natural Resources project area.		
Photo Eligibility	Photo must be taken by participants between the dates of December 1, 2022 and December 15, 2023. Each photo may be submitted only one time and in only one category. All photos must be taken using a digital camera.		
Photo Format	Must be .jpeg, .jpg, or .png. Contestants may use any file naming structure.		
Photo Entries	This is a stand-alone contest and not part of a qualifying contest or any other 4-H contest. There are no county entry restrictions. Individual 4-H member entries are unlimited.		
Entry Fee	\$10 per photo		
Photo Entry Method	Participants will upload photos in a separate online system called <u>Submittable</u> . Instructions and a direct link will be provided during the 4HOnline registration process.		
Deadlines & Entry Period	Registration on 4HOnline and entry to Submittable Opens: December 1, 2023 Registration on 4HOnline and access to Submittable Closes: December 15, 2023, at 11:59 p.m.		
4HOnline Event Name	2024 Texas 4-H Natural Resources Photography Contest		
Ratio and Size	Size Ratio: any size ratio, except for panoramic, is acceptable.  For this contest, panoramic is defined as a photo with an aspect ratio of 3:1 or 1:3 or wider/taller.  File Size: Photo must be a minimum of 1MB and a maximum of 20MB.  Tips: Upload the highest resolution possible. Review your photo at 100% size before uploading. Check your photo's file properties and/or metadata to ensure it meets the file size requirements.		
Alterations	Color and Black & White photos are allowed in all categories. Although slight computer enhanced photos are allowed, such as cropping, minor adjustment of lighting, and red eye reduction; substantially altered photography, such as applying design styles, or using computer graphics will disqualify an entry.		
Text on Photographs	Photographs <b>must not</b> contain camera or user placed text. This includes such things as date stamps, comments, watermarks, or titles. Text or wording that is part of the original photograph (i.e. photo of a state or national park sign, etc.) is acceptable.		
Original Work of 4-H Member	The entry must be the original photographic work of the 4-H member and not a photo taken by family members, other 4-H members, or secured from any other printed/electronic source. Any photo proven to be found as not original work will result in disqualification of ALL the 4-H member's entries into the Natural Resources Photography Contest. Additionally, actions may be taken against the 4-H member in regard to the Consequences of Misbehavior and Code of Conduct signed by the 4-H member. This action is considered theft, which is a major offense in the Texas 4-H Rules and Guidelines.		

### AWARDS, DISPLAY AND JUDGING 1. Category Awards: 30 awards/3 in each category; each of the 10 categories will have a Junior, Intermediate, and Senior winner based on Judging Criteria score and judges' choice (there can be multiple 100 point photos in one age division and category); \$25 e-card per winner. Awards and 2. Best of Category Awards: 10 awards/1 in each category; judges will choose from the 3 winners in each Recognition category; \$50 e-card per winner. 3. Best of Age Division Awards: 3 awards/1 in each age division; judges will choose from the 10 Category NEW!! Award winners in each age division; \$100 e-card per winner. 4. Best of Show Overall: 1 award; judges will choose from the 3 Best of Age Division winners; \$200 e-card for the winner. Due to the date of the contest entry deadline being near the beginning of the winter holidays, judging will take place in January. Contest results will be announced following the judging by postings on the 4-H Natural Resources webpages, Facebook, and Instagram. Contest awards will be emailed using the email Judging and Results address given on the 4HOnline registration. All photos submitted will be judged and scored independently on Submittable using the Contest Judging Criteria standards of excellence (see Judging Criteria sheet on page 4). Comments from judges will also be provided on the online scoresheet. **RELEASES** Photos that are deemed obscene, vulgar, sexually oriented, hateful, threatening, or otherwise violate any Content decency standards or laws are strictly prohibited. The Texas 4-H Youth Development Program reserves the right to determine and refuse inappropriate or unsuitable entries. The Texas 4-H Youth Development Program respects the rights related to copyright laws and intellectual Copyright property. All photos must be the participant's own original work. Use of a photo from other sources/people without permission is not allowed. By entry, the participant grants permission to the Texas 4-H Youth Development Program, Texas A&M AgriLife Display and Extension, and any other public or private agency authorized by the Texas 4-H Youth Development Program, **Future Usage Rights** the use, and rights associated to the use of the photographic likeness, in promotional publications, and other media, without compensation. Certain photos may be used for 4-H program and marketing uses. It is required that each participant have sufficient permission granted to both them and the Texas 4-H Youth Model and Development Program to publish and use as needed any photo showing recognizable locations or people **Property Releases** which may be restricted. Documentation should be retained by the participant and be available upon request from the Texas 4-H Youth Development Program. **DISQUALIFICATION** • Broken content rule. ### **TEXAS 4-H NATURAL RESOURCES PHOTOGRAPHY CONTEST 2023-2024 CATEGORIES**

### **AQUATIC SCIENCE**

Photos capturing the life or the study of life in the water. Photos could include:

- Any life in a water body such as fish, insects, other invertebrates, reptiles, amphibians, mammals that live predominately in the water, and aquatic vegetation.
- Any persons actively studying the aquatic life or equipment of aquatic study.
- Education of persons in aquatic science.
- Aquatic habitats.

Does not include photos of fishing or fish and other aquatic organisms being caught with fishing equipment.

### **ENTOMOLOGY**

Photos capturing the life or the insects in any habitat or environment. Photos could include:

- Any insect life or habitat.
- Any persons actively studying the insect life or equipment of entomology study.
- Education of persons in entomology.

### **FORESTRY**

Photos capturing the life of trees, the study of forestry, or the forestry industry. Photos could include:

- Any tree life in the form of a whole tree or any parts, such as buds, leaves, blooms, fruit, bark, etc.
- Any persons actively studying forestry or equipment used in this study.
- · Education of persons in forestry.
- Any persons actively working in the forestry industry or equipment used in this industry.
- Forest habitats.

Can include photos of wildlife using forest habitats in a specific way as long as the forest is the major focus of the photo and not the wildlife.

### HUNTING

Photos capturing the life or the activity of hunting. Photos could include:

- Any activity involved in legal hunting and must include a firearm, bow, or other legal hunting equipment in the photo. Could be a hunting camp scene with firearms safely stored.
- Any persons actively hunting pictured with the equipment of hunting including hunting dogs.
- Any photo of game killed in a hunt must include the hunter with the animal in an ethical, respectful pose, cleaned of any and all blood, with no internal parts visible including the tongue, and showing only the bag limit of the hunter or hunters pictured.
- Education of persons in hunting.

All photos with firearms must depict safe, legal, and ethical portrayals of hunting, otherwise they will be disqualified.

### **OUTDOOR EDUCATION**

Photos capturing the wide variety of activity taking place in the outdoors specifically beyond the concrete boundaries of any size town. Photos could include:

- Any form of an outdoor activity involving camping, outdoor cooking, hiking, rock-climbing, off-road biking, paddling, swimming, star gazing, fire building, first aid, or knot tying.
- Any persons actively pursuing any of those outdoor activities.
   Photos of any type of habitats or vista should include some type of activity equipment such as a tent, climbing gear, campfire, backpack, etc.
- Education of persons in outdoor education activities.

Does not include photos of fishing, hunting, or other activities described by another category including the gear used in those activities.

### SHOOTING SPORTS

Photos capturing the activity of shooting firearms and archer equipment outside of a hunting scenario. Photos could include:

- Any safe shooting activity involving an individual or a group. All shooters and persons pictured must be practicing firearm and range safety while wearing proper safety equipment. The activity must be portrayed with no safety infractions.
- · Education of persons in shooting sports.
- Any equipment used in shooting sports such as a focus on a firearm, ammo, shooting vest, target, etc.

Does not include photos of hunting or live wildlife being hunted or killed game. All photos with firearms must depict safe, legal, and ethical portrayals of shooting sports, otherwise they will be disqualified.

### **SPORTFISHING**

Photos capturing the life or the activity of sportfishing. Photos could include:

- Any activity involved in legal fishing and must include a rod and reel, bow, or other legal fishing equipment in the photo. Could be a fishing camp, shoreline scene, or boating scene with equipment placed to keep it and the anglers safe.
- Any equipment used in sportfishing such as a focus on a rod, reel, lures, fishing vest, tackle box, etc.
- Any persons actively fishing pictured with the fishing equipment, or a single fish caught with a lure or complete rod and reel in the photo.
- Any photo of fish being held by the angler must show the fish being handled in an ethical, respectful way and showing only the bag limit of the angler or anglers pictured.
- Education of persons in sportfishing.

All photos must depict safe, legal, and ethical portrayals of fishing and boating, otherwise they will be disqualified.

### **RANGE SCIENCE**

Photos capturing the study of and management of rangelands. Photos could include:

- The native vegetation within a rangeland in the form of a whole plant or plants or any parts, such as buds, leaves, blooms, fruit, etc.
- Any persons actively studying rangeland or equipment used in this study.
- Any persons actively working in the range science industry or equipment used in this industry.
- Education of persons in range science.
- Rangeland habitats

Can include photos of wildlife using rangeland habitats in a specific way as long as the rangeland is the major focus of the photo and not the wildlife.

### **WATER CONSERVATION & EDUCATION**

Photos capturing study of water use and conservation, the education of water conservation, and the process of water use and conservation industry. Photos could include:

- Any use of water depicting conservation of the resource.
- Any persons actively studying the water use and conservation or equipment of that study.
- Any persons testing water quality, or the equipment used in testing.
- Natural water resources available in Texas.
- Education of persons in water conservation and use.
- Active work in the water conservation industry and the equipment used.

### **WILDLIFE & FISHERIES**

Photos capturing the life, the study of life, and the management of wildlife in Texas. Photos could include:

- Any wildlife species found in Texas including fish, insects, other invertebrates, reptiles, amphibians, mammals, birds, etc.
- · Any persons actively studying wildlife or equipment of that study.
- Any persons actively managing wildlife or equipment of management.
- Education of persons in wildlife & fisheries or management of these species
- Wildlife habitats.

Does not include photos of wildlife <u>not</u> found wild in Texas during some part of the year.

### **Texas 4-H Natural Resources Photography Contest Judging Criteria**

The initial judging of each photo is determined by the standards of excellence outlined below, not by comparison with other photos. Before preparing your entry for submission please carefully review the judging criteria.

### Texas 4-H Photography Contest

2023 - 2024 State Rules and Guidelines

Created: September 19, 2023

### **PURPOSE**

The Texas 4-H Photography Contest encourages self-expression and allows youth to demonstrate skills learned in the area of photography, including the use of photographic equipment and processing of photographs.

### **OBJECTIVES**

- To develop skills in composition, light, story line, posing, and awareness.
- To gain knowledge about cameras, camera settings, photography dimension and resolution.
- To encourage 4-H members to use photography as a meaningful communication tool in their lives.
- To provide a photography project showcase opportunity for senior 4-H members.
- To continue to share the message of 4-H.
- To utilize photographs which can promote and strengthen the 4-H program.

RULES AND PRO	CEDURES
Participation Grades	Senior age division (4-H members in grades 9, 10, 11 and 12 as of September 1, 2023)
Photo Eligibility	All photos must be taken with a digital camera (smartphone cameras are included). Photo must be taken by participants between the dates of January 1, 2023 and the time of entry. Photos may be submitted only one time and in only one category.
Photo Format	Must be .jpeg, .jpg, or .png. Contestants may use any file naming structure.
Qualifying from County	Each county may enter only one entry per category for a total of 15 entries. As such, counties are highly encouraged to have a selection process (such as a contest) in place to determine each photo that advances in the 15 categories.
Entry Fee	\$10 per photo
Registration and Uploading	Step 1: Register and pay for entries in 4HOnline Step 2: Upload all photos in Submittable. Instructions and a direct link will be provided during the 4HOnline registration process.
Deadlines & Entry Period	Registration on 4HOnline and Submittable Opens: April 1, 2024 Registration on 4HOnline and Submittable Closes: April 15, 2024 at 11:59 pm Entries must be approved by the county office by 5 PM on April 19, 2024  No late entries will be accepted in either system.
<b>Event Name</b>	2023-2024 Texas 4-H Photography Contest
Ratio and Size	Size Ratio: any size ratio, except for panoramic, is acceptable.  For this contest, panoramic is defined as a photo with an aspect ratio of 3:1 or 1:3 or wider/taller.  File Size: Photo must be a minimum of 1 MB (1,000 KB) and a maximum of 20 MB.  Tips: Upload the highest resolution possible. Review your photo at 100% size before uploading. Check your photo's file properties and/or metadata to ensure it meets the file size requirements. 1 MB (megabyte) is equivelant to 1,000 KB (kilobytes). Photos that are less than 1,000 KB do not meet the minimum file size requirement.
Alterations	Color and Black & White photos are allowed in all categories. Although slight computer enhancements are allowed, such as cropping, minor adjustment of lighting, and red eye reduction; substantially altered photography, such as applying design styles, or using computer graphics will disqualify an entry. Any other alteration, manipulation, or edits to a photo would require the photo to be entered into the Enhanced category.
Text on Photographs	Photographs <b>must not</b> contain camera or user placed text. This includes such things as date stamps, comments, watermarks, or titles. Text or wording that is part of the original photograph (i.e. photo of a street sign, etc.) is acceptable.

### **Original Work** 4-H member

The entry must be the original photographic work of the 4-H member and not a photo taken by family members, other 4-H members, or secured from any other printed/electronic source. Any photo proven to be found as not original work will result in disqualification of ALL the 4-H member's entries into the Photography Contest. Additionally, actions may be taken against the 4-H member in regards to the Consequences of Misbehavior and Code of Conduct signed by the 4-H member.

### AWARDS, DISPLAY AND JUDGING

### Awards and Recognition

- 1. Quality Awards: Blue, Red, White and Green Participation quality awards will be given based on the total score value. Score ranges for each award are outlined on the attached score sheet.
- 2. Best of Show Awards: A Best of Show rosette will be awarded to one photo in each category.
- 3. Cash Awards: Each Best of Show winner will receive an e-gift card valued at \$250.00. REVISED Tentatively, award packets for each county will be available for pickup at Texas 4-H Roundup. If the packet is not picked up, it will be mailed to the county office afterwards. Score sheets with comments will be made available through Submittable. Score sheet access is tied to the email address of the Submiitable account holder.

### Judging and Results

For Quality Awards, each photograph will be judged against a set of judging criteria, and not against photographs of peers. Based on total points awarded for each photograph, the participant will be awarded either a blue, red, white, or a participation ribbon (outlined on the attached score sheet). The Best of Show Awards is a competitive process whereby judges will select the best photo within a given catetory. Volunteer judges will make those determinations and all decisions are final. Results will be available on the Texas 4-H Website after Texas 4-H Roundup concludes.

### Roundup Display and **Participation**

This is not a Texas 4-H Roundup contest. However, if timing and resources permit, photos may be displayed publicly during Texas 4-H Roundup. When possible, county award packets will also be made available for counties to pick up during Roundup. Roundup participation is not required by photography contestants.

### RELEASES

### Content

Photos that are deemed obscene, vulgar, sexually-oriented, hateful, threatening, or otherwise violate any decency standards or laws are strictly prohibited. The Texas 4-H Youth Development Program reserves the right to determine and refuse inappropriate or unsuitable entries.

### Copyright

The Texas 4-H Youth Development Program respects the rights related to copyright laws and intellectual property. All photos must be the participant's own original work. Use of a photo from other sources/people is not allowed. Violaters will be subject to the Consequences of Misbehavior policies found in the Texas 4-H Rules and Guidelines.

### Display and **Future Usage Rights**

By entry, the participant grants permission to the Texas 4-H Youth Development Program, Texas A&M AgriLife Extension, and any other public or private agency authorized by the Texas 4-H Youth Development Program, the use, and rights associated to the use of the photographic likeness, in promotional publications, and other media, without compensation. Certain photos may be used for 4-H program and marketing uses.

### Model and Property Releases

It is required that each participant have sufficient permission granted to both the photographer and the Texas 4-H Youth Development Program to publish and use, as needed, any photo showing any recognizable locations or people photographed. Documentation should be retained by the participant and be available upon request from the Texas 4-H Youth Development Program.

### **DISQUALIFICATION**

### **Possible** Reasons for Disqualification

- Broken content rule. This includes inappropriate or unsuitable content.
- Broken copyright rule. Photo is not the original work of the 4-H member. This action is considered theft, which is a major offense in the Texas 4-H Rules & Guidelines. REVISED
- Broken display and future rights usage rule.
- Broken model and property release rule.
- Category: Does not meet category criteria, rules or guidelines. (see category descriptions)

Disqualification for any reason will forfeit all

- Category: Multiple county entries into a category.
- Category: Same photo entered into multiple categories.
- County did not select/certify photograph to represent county by the deadline.
- Entry fee not paid or only partial fee paid.
- Extremely poor quality and/or low resolution causing the subject matter to be unrecognizable.
- Manipulation of photo beyond what is allowed.

### **TEXAS 4-H PHOTOGRAPHY CONTEST 2023-2024 CATEGORIES**

It is extremely important that 4-H members, project leaders, parents, and County Extension Agents review the descriptions of each category very carefully. Do not enter photographs into categories that are duplicates from other categories or ones that do not clearly meet the category description. Photographs that do not meet the description of the category will be disqualified.

### **ANIMALS - DOMESTIC**

Photos focusing on the various animals that have been tamed and made fit for a human environment. To be considered domesticated, the animal must have their behavior, life cycle, or physiology systemically altered as a result of being under human control for many generations.

**Examples:** Chickens, cows, dogs, cats, hamsters, horses, pigs, sheep, goats, etc. All waterfowl (ducks and geese) should be entered in Animals - Wildlife.

### **ANIMALS - WILDLIFE**

Category focuses on animals not typically tamed or domesticated and commonly found in the wilderness or bodies of water throughout the country and world. Photos can be of wildlife in nature, zoos, and/or petting zoos.

Examples: Birds, deer, elephants, snakes, whales, etc.

Photos that do not fit into one of the other categories.

Not allowed: A duplicate photo also entered in another category.

### **DETAILS & MACRO**

Getting in close is the name of the game for this category. The goal is to zoom in close on an object to see its finer details or to make small objects appear life-sized or larger that we do not normally get to see with the naked eye.

Examples: Insect eyes, veins on a leaf, a reflection in a water droplet, etc.

### **ELEMENTS OF DESIGN**

Images use of graphic elements of design. Photos that showcase line, shape, pattern, form, texture, perspective, etc. Photo can consist of any subject matter.

Examples: Line, pattern, perspective, shape, etc.

Not allowed: Digital creations or graphic designs made in software such as Photoshop, InDesign or Illustrator.

### **ENHANCED**

A single photo that has been technically manipulated to be an abstract, panoramic, stitched or composite image. Others variations are allowed as well.

Examples: Software edited composites and creations, images greatly manipulated with a variety of filters, photos with artistic borders, photos stitched into a panoramic, etc.

### **FOOD**

A still life specialization of photography, aimed at producing attractive photographs of food for use in such items of advertisements, packaging, menus and/or cookbooks.

Examples: Cakes/pies, Easter eggs, fruits and place settings, ingredients, sandwiches, Thanksgiving dinner, etc.

Not allowed: A photo of alcohol beverages.

### LANDSCAPE & NATURE (NON-ANIMAL)

The focus of this category includes landscapes, outdoor scenics, nature images, sunsets, urban landscapes, seascapes, cityscapes, and farms. Images focus on the beauty of the outdoors.

**Examples:** Gardens/landscapes, outdoors, scenics, etc. Not allowed: Primary subject is a person or wildlife.

### **LEADING LINE**

This image composition technique features lines that draw the viewer's eye from point A to point B, which is the primary subject. **Example:** A river that begins in the foreground and draws your attention to a photogenic bridge in the background.

### LONG EXPOSURE

Also known as time-exposure or slow-shutter, this technique involves using a long-duration shutter speed. It can be used to sharply capture stationary elements of an image while blurring, smearing, or obsuring the moving elements. It is also used in lowlight conditions.

Examples: fireworks, moving water, light trails, Milky Way, light painting, night or low-light conditions, etc.

### MOTION/ACTION

The capture of movement within a single photo. The subject appears stopped or "frozen".

Examples: Ferris wheel spinning, sporting events, horse running across a field, etc.

### **PEOPLE**

Photos focus from all walks of life, parenting and family, children, babies, models/fashion, sports, and couples. All individuals in the photos must have provided consent and permission as a subject. If requested, a release will be needed from the photographer and subject.

Examples: Babies, families, kids, portraits, models/fashion, etc.

### PLANT/FLORA

Photos of interesting, unique, and beautiful flowers and flora. Photography can occur outdoors or indoors. Photo subject should be that of a single flower, plant, bush, tree, etc. Large collections of plant/flora should be considered for entry into the Landscape & Nature category.

Examples: A rose, an upward shot of a tree, etc.

### SHADOW/SILHOUETTE

A silhouette is an outline that appears dark (typically a single color) with little or no details/features against a brighter background. Recording patterns of light and shade for a desired effect or emphasis is the definition of a shadow. The silhouette or shadow must be the primary subject and focus of the image.

Examples: shadows/silhouettes of people, plants, animals, structures, architectures, or natural structures.

Not allowed: reflections

### THEME (New)

The 2023-2024 theme is "Abandoned". Photographs capturing the essence of forgotten or neglected places, things, or structures; emphasizing its worn and forsaken nature.

Please take all necessary safety precautions around abandoned buildings/structures.
